Having just been established as a new diocese, Nyamira is now part of the church project, building their first Project 24 site. Several LCMS missionaries, the bishops of each ELCK dioceses as well as the acting archbishop Dr. Rev. Joseph Ochola attended the ceremony. It

was a beautiful day in Nyamira as we took a tour of the grounds that were donated for the new site. The architect as well as the contractor were present, enabling the ELCK leadership and the community to meet them and encourage them in their work. Beyond 24 Youth Camp

In November, our Project 24 site in Udom hosted our first Beyond 24 Youth Camp. As the children graduate from class 8, they continue on to either secondary school or a technical school. They no longer stay at the Project 24 sites but board within their new schools and are considered to now be in our Beyond 24 program. The children are still part of our Christ's Care for Children: Kenya program as they continue their education. The sponsorship pays for their boarding and education. Even though the children are away, it is important that they remain connected and receive religious instruction. One of the ways to help do this, is to have the older students come together during their school holidays and participate in a youth camp. For one week, 61 students were instructed by local pastors, evangelists, deaconesses and site managers. Their courses were not necessarily easy topics. Some of the workshops included: roles of youth in the church, Pentecostal influence in Kenya, handling the teenage years, and can youth be missionaries? Overall, the camp was a success and a wonderful way for the local church to continue to reach out and teach the children on relevant subjects. We hope to continue these gatherings in the new year.



Sustainability Projects



Each Project 24 site has been growing their sustainability projects within their compounds. They have become creative as well as tenacious when it comes to starting these projects. There have been some ups and downs, but now they are beginning to see their projects become fruitful. Such projects have included purchasing milking cows and planting their own crops. We are happy to report that the site managers have added a few more projects in the last month: flour milling and building guest rooms. Tumaini now has a milling machine that can help grind flour for the site as well as for the surrounding community. Udom is adding guest rooms to their site to enable visitors to come and stay there. We applaud the site boards for continuing to be innovative and bringing their new plans to fruition.
